Tattenai's Letter

Tattenai, the governor of all the Persian territory west of the Euphrates River, went to Judah. He found the Temple reconstruction in Jerusalem was progressing rapidly. He asked Zerubbabel and the other leaders, "Who are you, and who authorized you to rebuild this Temple?"

They replied, "We are the servants of the God of heaven and earth, and we are rebuilding the Temple that was built many years ago by a great king of Israel.
