Ptolemy's Elephants

For the third day in a row, five hundred elephants were made drunk with wine until they were angry and confused. Their keeper tied small swords and knives to their sides and stomachs. They were ready to trample the Jews detained in the hippodrome.

At dawn Ptolemy IV Philopator king of Egypt stormed out of his palace and made his way to the hippodrome. A large crowd had already gathered there to watch the spectacle of this mass execution.

Meanwhile, the Jews were praying, "God Almighty. Show us your mercy. Save us."

Just as Philopator reached the hippodrome with his elephants and his army, God sent two angels to protect the people of Israel. The soldiers became disoriented; Philopator shook with fear; the elephants turned around and started trampling the troops marching behind them.
