The Death of Judas Maccabeus

Judas Maccabeus heard that the Romans were a very strong nation; that they were friendly and open to alliances; that they were kind and supportive of those who came to them asking for help. He was told their leadership was congenial and suffered no infighting or jealousy whatsoever.

This image of Rome did not exactly jibe with reality. The Romans were ruthless in war, and instead of cultivating peace on behalf of the peoples they conquered they imposed peace under their own rules, which included vicious retribution for any infringement. Their leaders were constantly battling each other for power, and assassination for political gain was a common occurrence.
